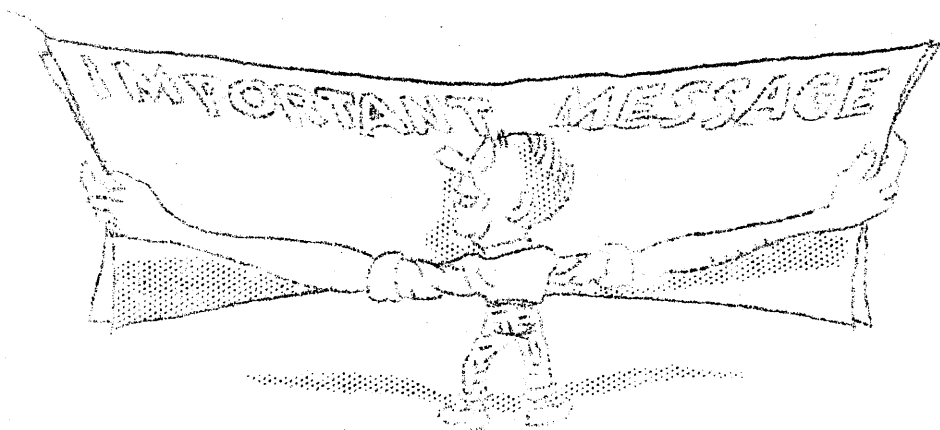

ODE TO A PIPEWRENCH

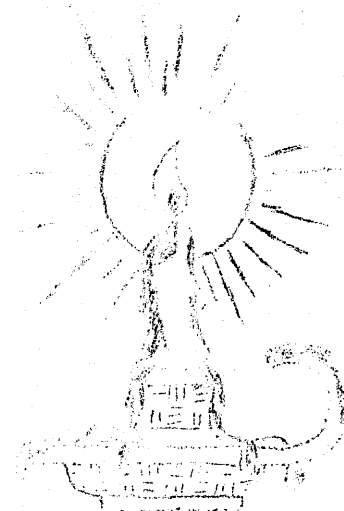
When winter comes with snow and ice,

ELECTRONICS CLUB NEWS

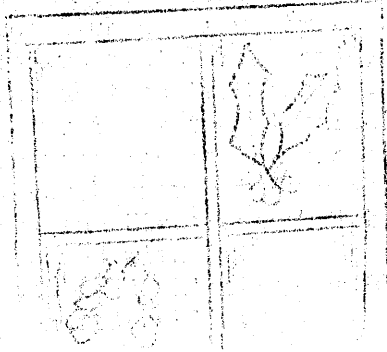

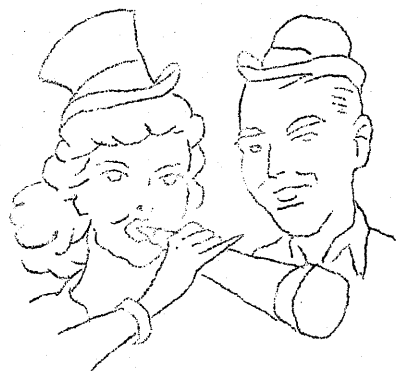
PAINTERS AND DECORATORS 2nd year
