Views of an overworked NAIT Student

While in a NAITSA office I heard a comment to the effect that NAIT Students Association would have to hire professional typists to do the typing of the year book because there were not enough interested students who would type for the yearbook.

This sounded quite typical! From this stemmed the idea, "If some people get paid to do the work for students of NAIT, why shouldn't all get paid?"

Meaning: every person who presently occu-

pies a position on the Yearbook, Nugget, NAITSA, or the Radio club should get paid for the time he or she puts in. The reasoning behind the idea lies in the fact that a group of 24 students fill positions on the named organizations, and these 24 students are by no means enough. They represent 2% of the total student population of the institute leaving many more openings. But no one shows up, so the lonely 2% work their heads off for a lazy dull uninterested 98%. If the greater majority people of the school do not care and do not participate in the governing organizations of NAIT, those who do should receive something like \$1.75 per hour instead of the kick in the pants they get now.

Each of the above 24 working students puts in an average of 10 hours a week for 30 school weeks. At \$1.75 an hour this comes to a meager \$22,000 it would cost you to pay these workers for a year. It amounts to a \$11 increase per person in students fees. This is by no means too much considering the service they provide for you.

Do not take this too lightly, for if more students do not help run NAITSA and affiliated organizations something like the above proposed payment plan could go into operation; or all services would be resolved and you would end up with nothing, exactly what 98% of the students here deserve.

very good example occurred in the newspaper office. A student came and wanted to advertise but at his own terms and not the ones that were offered. It is typical of most students.




