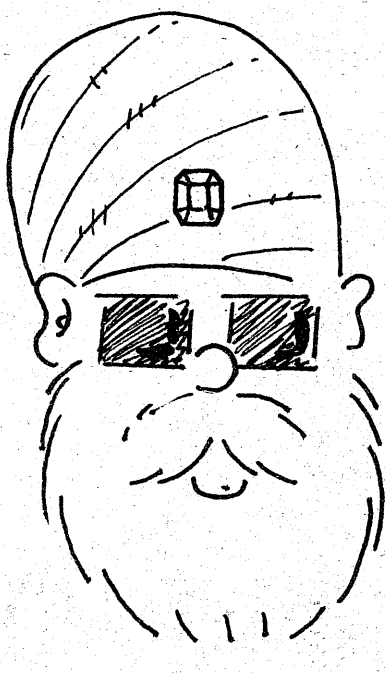

Differential Fees Racist Forum Told

EDMONTON (CUP) -- Racism, not economics, is at the base of the Alberta government's decision to impose differential fees on first-year visa students, an Edmonton alderman told a recent University of Alberta forum.

David Leadbetter told an audience of 150 that "we are talking about a discriminatory fee, not a differential fee," in reference to the province's recently announced fee hikes for international students. The two-tier fee system will force a \$300 tuition hike for those attending universities and \$150 more for college students effective in September.

Provincial New Democratic Party Leader Grant Notely told the forum the government leaders behind the hike were not racists but that they "just don't understand the implications behind the move.

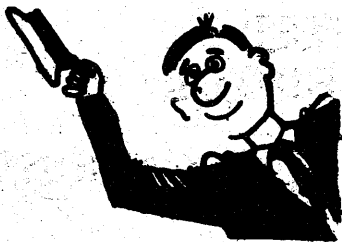

Commissionaires Corner



The topic for this column is presented for the express purpose of enlightening any institute people who might not be aware of their responsibility with regard to the SECURITY of the institute.

During after hours, the institute is kept locked and persons desiring entry must do so via the MAIN entrance at the east doors of the Main Lobby. They are required to sign in the register and to state the time of entry and the location of the room or area they intend to visit.

All the Staff, Instructors and students are responsible to resist any plea for entry into ANY area on the institute by anyone. Even though the person is recognized as a fellow institute member, entry must be refused. The reason for signing the register is for the identification of an area and person and time. This cannot be accomplished when entry is gained without any traceable action.

Any institute personnel or student should report an illegal entry as soon as possible when discovered. This is not a petty act on the part of the person reporting. It is a safeguard for his personal property as well as the property of the Institute

that well may be jeopardized. During holiday periods when the Institute is kept locked for longer than normal periods, institute personnel and students should make an effort to cooperate as much as possible. A quick call on the grey phone to

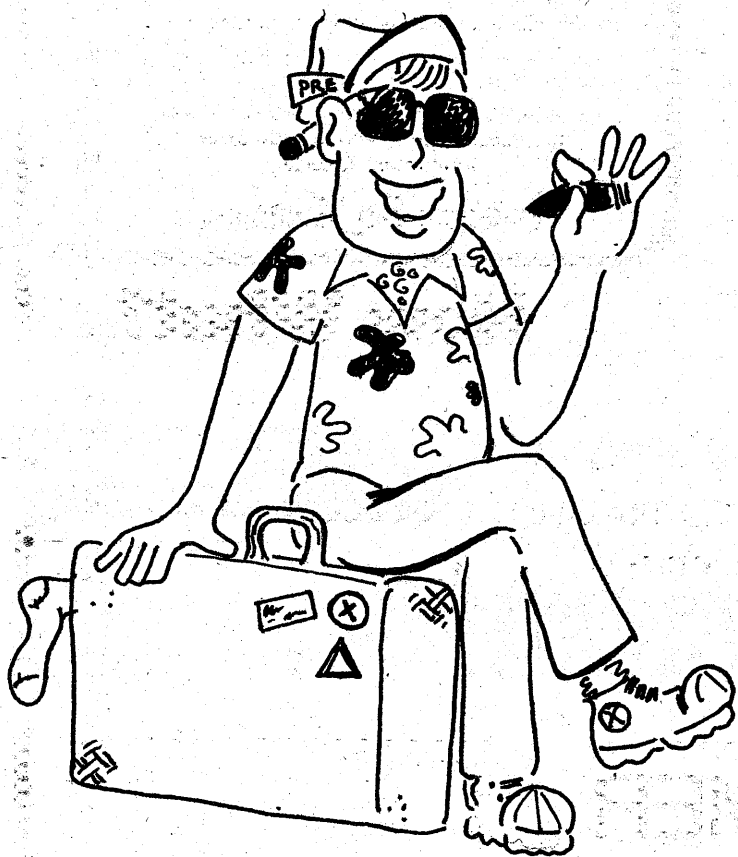

Late last summer I was in Ontario covering the Madoc Tulip Festival for the Stettler news. This festival is a tri-annual affair, and the boss covered it once about three hundred years ago. And that's what happened at the Madoc Tulip Festival.

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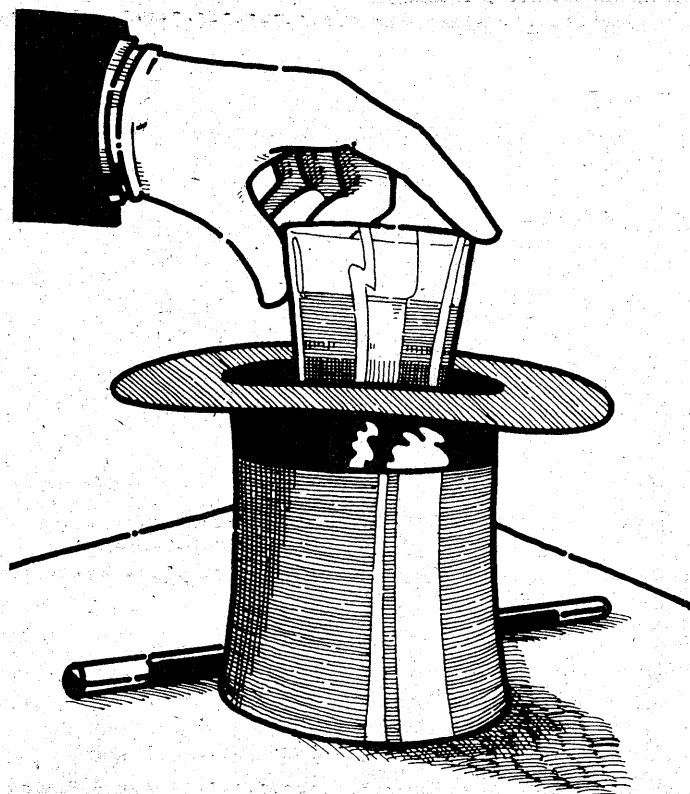
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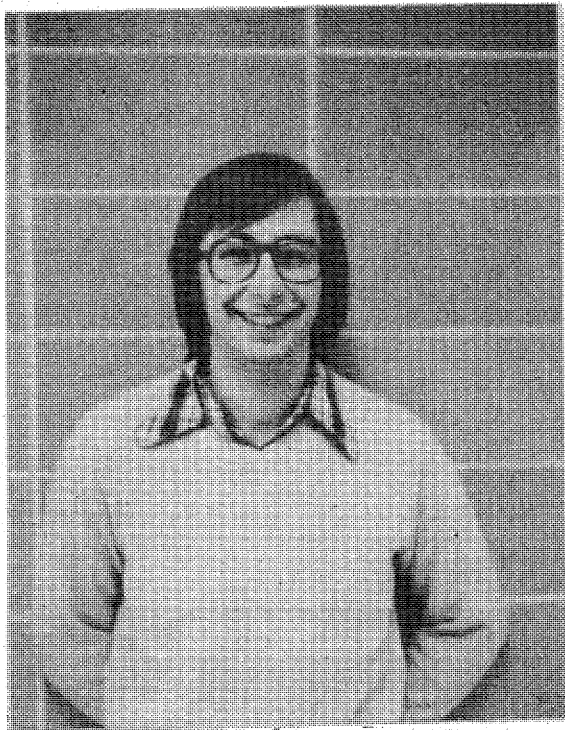
